Wreaths Across America is excited to launch our new education materials this year, with a focus on character development and service projects for young people of all ages. We believe the 10 Special Qualities our Veterans embody, represented by the 10 Balsam Bouquets that make a Veteran's Wreath are attributes that all young people in America can master.

Veterans of the United States military have made many sacrifices on our behalf, and on behalf of people around the globe, those currently serving in the military make the same sacrifices. Perhaps now more than ever, young people need to understand that those who made and continue to make those sacrifices do so on their behalf-to protect and defend the freedoms granted to them in the United States Constitution. Those who have served and those who continue to serve have a belief in the greater good of our country, and we need to TEACH our youth to REMEMBER and HONOR their service.

With that in mind, we are happy to introduce a special project for our youth that will encompass the Mission of Wreaths Across America to Remember-Honor-Teach. The Veterans' Oral History Project encourages young people to interview a veteran, service member or Gold Star Family member to learn about the sacrifices our military make on behalf of our country.

Young people who complete the Veterans' Oral History Project will receive a replica dog tag with their name and the name of their veteran. A matching dog tag will be created and placed on a balsam fir tree on the tip land in Maine where balsam is harvested to make the veterans' wreaths that are sponsored and placed on the headstones of our nation's heroes each December. This is part of Wreaths Across America's <u>Veteran Remembrance Tree Program</u>. Annually, participants will be put into a random drawing for a chance to come to Maine as part of the Stem to Stone event weekend in the summer to place their veteran's dog tag.

For the purposes of the WAA Veterans' Oral History Project, we will use the following definition of an oral history: *an oral history is an interview that records a person's recollection of experiences, thoughts, and feelings about a specific event or a period of time*. These interviews can be conducted via audio or video recording (with permission) or in written word. We encourage participants to be creative and share any materials they feel are important to best demonstrate their interviewee's service.

WHO can participate?

• Young people of all ages and grades.

WHAT does the student need to do?

• Interview an individual who has served in any branch of the United States Armed Forces or a Gold Star Family member. (A Gold Star Family is a family who has had a loved one die while they were serving in the military or who died as a result of their service in the military. Gold Star Family members love for others to learn about their fallen heroes, so don't be afraid to ask!)

- Record the interview results on paper or using digital technology.

Make sure to include the completed copy of the interview release form.

WHEN does the interview need to take place?

• The interview can take place anytime from March 1, 2022, until November 11, 2022, Veterans Day. **WHERE** does the interview need to take place?

• Any place that works for the interviewer and interviewee. You can Zoom the meeting and let the interviewee know it will be recorded.

WHY interview a veteran?

• Veterans make many sacrifices for our country, it is important to TEACH our youth the value of freedom.

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Hints for Conducting an Interview:

- 1. Decide who you would like to interview.
- 2. Ask the person if they will participate.
- 3. If they agree to participate, tell them you will need the Wreaths Across America Veterans' Oral History
- 4. Release form signed by them. You can email the form to them; they can sign it digitally and return it to you.
- 5. Let them know you will be asking about their military service and that you are conducting this interview as part of the Wreaths Across America Veterans' Oral History Project.
- 6. Set a date and time for the interview.
- 7. Be prepared!
- 8. Write down your questions to help keep the interview moving smoothly.
- 9. At the beginning of the interview state your name, the name of the interviewee and the date.
- 10. Be courteous.
- 11. Listen carefully.
- 12. Take notes during the interview. If you plan to record the interview, ask permission first.
- 13. Thank the person for participating.
- 14. Send a written thank you note for their participation and their service.

Suggested Interview Questions

When and where were you born?

Where did you live as a child?

What are your earliest memories as a child?

What values and beliefs did your parents pass on to you?

Who were your childhood heroes? Why?

What career ambitions did you have as a child?

Describe your first job. How old were you?

What other jobs have you worked at?

In which branch of the military did you serve?

When did you serve in the military?

Tell me about your military service.

Is there anything else you would like to share about your military experience?

Is there anything we have not talked about today that you would like to share?

Thank you for your service to our country and for taking the time to talk to me today!!
