Grades: 5 th and 6 th	Lesson: Memorial Day; Find a Way to Serve on Memorial Day in Remembrance of Our Fallen Heroes

MATERIALS:	Computer/laptop; internet (with access to YouTube); Smart Board; copies of the Memorial Day K-W-L Worksheet; copies of <i>America's White Table</i> Story Elements Worksheet; copies of <i>America's White Table</i> Matching Worksheet; copies of the Memorial Day Quilt Drawing sheet.									
Engage: Hook the students	Activity – Hand out the Memorial Day K-W-L Worksheet. Give the students a few minutes to fill in the first section- “What I Know”. Play the History of Memorial Day Video, https://youtu.be/YChfpVD5xpK Students will complete the K-W-L Worksheet.									
Explore: Students make sense of a concept through observations.	Play the Read Aloud book, <i>America's White Table</i> , author, Margot Theis Raven, Illustrator Mike Benny https://youtu.be/uePSkyqYesE Answer the following Reflection Questions from <i>America's White Table</i> video: Why did the family set up this small white table? What effect did it have on their Uncle John? How do you think setting the white table would affect Veterans that we know today? What is a hero to you? Explain to students that families who have a loved one who has died while they are on active duty in the military are called Gold Star Families.

Enrichment/Service-Learning Project	Students can pick from many projects, placing small flags on the graves of fallen heroes at a local cemetery; make cards and send them to veterans in a local VA Home, VA Hospital or nursing home; share what you have learned about Memorial Day in class with your family and friends; interview a veteran as a part of the Wreaths Across America Oral History Project.
